5. Department profile

The Department of English of St John's is as old as the college itself-140 years and it has the unique honour of having had native speakers of English as faculty members. Names of former Professors like the Revd. Schaffter, Bennett and Philip Lea, all from England, have added charm and attraction to this Department.

From a humble beginning, the Department keeps growing, catering to the academic and intellectual needs of many. At first, English was offered as a compulsory Language Paper for Intermediate and Degree courses. In the year 1968, taking into account the growing demand of the students to study English Literature as a major subject, a special graduation course in English was introduced. The desire to graduate with English as the major subject kept growing and hence the approved strength in the undergraduate course was raised to 40 in each class. The Department of English was able to produce a number of University rank holders each year in the Madurai University and for a long time the renowned writer and thinker, Prof. D. A. Thangasamy was heading the Department.

Having been much rated by its productive performance resulting in moulding the future leaders of the society like IAS Officers, Central Ministers, Executives in the Police Department, Administrators in Central Excise, Professors and Principals in various Universities and Colleges all over India. The Department went for up-gradation with the university's approval and government grant, the Post Graduation course (M.A) in English was introduced from 1971 onwards. Both men and women students were admitted to the PG course in English. Dr. Francis Soundararajan became the first head of the Post Graduate Department of English of St. John's heading a team of 22 Professors and Assistant Professors.

As expected, the Department of English continued to produce Gold Medalists year after year and today it can boast of its proud alumnae shining in various walks of life as world famous musicians and singers, straightforward IAS/IPS officers, popular politicians and many great academicians.

Right now there are around 190 students in the B.A. course and 60 in M.A. There are 16 members in the faculty of English and all of them are experts in their own fields. Most of our staff members are Ph.D. degree holders and many more are on the verge of completing their Ph.Ds. Many faculty members have been guiding Research Scholars of M.Phil. and Ph.D.

The Department of English also produces nearly 15 M.Phil scholars every year. The course is not only research but also in career-orientation and the faculty members are qualified in every way to guide M.Phil. Scholars.

The Research Department of English, St.John's College organised a one day workshop on 'Critical Theory Today', on 26th September 2017. Dr. A. Xavier Chandra Bose, Associate Professor and Hear of the Research Department of English, Lakshmipuram College of Arts and Science, Nagarcoil, was the resource person of the one day workshop.

Mr. U. Kethrapal, Assistant Professor of English welcomed the gathering. Presidential Address was given by Dr. S. John Kennady, the honourable principal. The enthusiastic participants were felicitated by Dr.R. JeyaSundararaj, the head of the department of English. Mr. S. Christober Jacob, Assistant Professor of English introduced the resource person to the audience.

The special lecture delivered by Dr. Xavier Chandra Bose was focussing on tradition of the literary theories, their past, their current position and their future. The history of literary theory starts from Greek philosophers Socrates, Plato and Aristotle. They laid foundation to the theories. Plato's *Republic* and Aristotle's *Poetics* were considered the classical literary theory texts.

Though the theories originated with the Greek scholars, twentieth century was considered the golden period for theories. Theories which exist today we're mostly invented or popularized during the twentieth century. He explained how the theories dominated the literary world and as a result of it how new criticism arrived which decentred criticism and encouraged a pure reading of literature.

At the end of the workshop, the resource person clarified the doubts of some students who eagerly asked him some clarifications.

5. Department Profile

5.1 About the Department

The department of History is one of the oldest departments in St. John's college. It runs a prestigious programme of under graduate studies which was launched in 1967, under the guidance of the then principal Prof. J. Vedasironmani. Currently eight faculty members and three hundred undergraduate students are here (English and Tamil Medium). The range of study starts from the Ancient History of India to the present World History. The department has earned name and fame since its inception.

Initially it was one man department, Prof. M.V. Subramaniam, who served from 1945 to 1962 and attached with the department of Economics. He has written a historical book namely "History of South India". He also participated and presented papers in various seminars organized by Madras Christian college, Tambaram and the University of Madras.

The full-fledged independent department of History was started in the year 1967. Prof. J. Moses Packiyaraj led the department. In the same year Prof. V. Masilamani and Prof. G. Gurubatham were also appointed. In the next year Prof. A. Narasimhan was inducted. The four member faculty did active role under the direction of Madurai Kamaraj University. Prof. A. Narasimhan was elected as a senator to the Madurai Kamaraj University through graduate constituency. Along with his regular duty he served more to the people of both

Tirunelveliand Kanyakumari districts. He wrote a book namely, "The National Integration of India" in Tamil (NjrpaxUikg;ghL - ,e;jpah).

In 1977, Prof. B.S.V. Dharmaraj was appointed in the department. The year 1983 is a landmark in the annals of the department. During this year the department was extended with the introduction of English Medium course. Prof. R. SoundararajPackianathan and Prof. J. Manuel joined as Lecturers in the same year. In 1983, Prof. R. Peter Perinbaraja joined the department as Assistant Professor. Prof. A. Arul Devadoss and Prof. M. Jeyasingh were also appointed in 1984. The faculty members have participated in a wide range of conference, workshops and seminars. In 1986, Prof. R. Peter Perinbaraja was transferred to Nazareth Morgochiscollege and As a result, the senior Professor from that college. Prof. A. SanthoskumarAsirvatham came to this department.

The pioneers of the department retired one by one. In 1995, Prof. A. Narasimhan became the Head of the department, Prof. G. Andrews was appointed in the same year. After the retirement of Prof. A. Narasimhan, Prof. A. SanthoskumarAsirvatham was heading the department. Prof. J. DevarajSelvakumar was appointed as a Lecturer in 2001. Prof. A. SanthoskumarAsirvatham introduced the new tradition of taking students in tours at National, Regional and Local level for the benefit of our student. Along with regular department works Prof. G. Andrews was appointed as NCC officer from 1996 to 2014. He did a remarkable service and got the award of the best NCC officer at the National level, "The Commendation Award".

In 1997, Prof. R. Peter Perinbaraja came back to his home Department. In 2009, Prof. J. Barnabas Jacob and Prof. V. JebamaniMonsingh were added in the Department. Prof. R. Peter Perinbaraja took over the headship of the Department in 2004. Prof. A. Arul Devadoss was appointed as a Principal in- charge of the Institution. Later, Prof. T.K. Stantley David has joined as a Lecturer in the Department in the year 2014. Both Prof. R. Peter Perinbaraja and Prof. A. Arul Devadoss were retired from their service in May 2016. Prof. M. Josephraj and Prof. J. Jeyasingh were appointed as Assistant Professor on 17th October 2016. Immediately after Prof. M. Jeyasingh, Dr. R. Stella was appointed as Assistant Professor on 4th October 2017. Prof. M. Jeyasingh retired from the service in the year 2017, After the retirement of Prof. M. Jeyasingh, Dr. G. Andrews was promoted as the Head of the Department in the year 2017. Our graduate culture involves a varied programme of workshops, seminars and

conferences in which the Department operates closely with other disciplines and St. John's network of inter disciplinary institutes and research centres.

Above all, History at St. John's is marked out by the vibrancy of the Department's intellectual community and passion we put into understanding and interpreting the past. Since the origin of the Department is splendid, many thousands of students have passed through our doors. History graduates live and work around the world. They are Teachers, Lecturers, Script writers, Journalists, Authors, Television and Radio presenters, Producers, Museum Directors, Lawyers, Magistrates, Accountants, designers, Defense and Police personnel, various organizations of Christian Missionaries and Pastors. History Department is one of the premium Departments in St. John's College.

We, the Department of History organized the Golden Jubilee celebration in 2017 -18 academic years. Nearly 25 programs both indoor and outdoor events were arranged. On 7th April 2018, Golden Jubilee Historian's Sangamam was organized. Nearly 250 Alumni had participated from different parts of India.

5. Department Profile



5. Department Profile

5.1 About the Department

The Department of Mathematics of St. John's College is as old as the college itself and it has the unique honour of having had scholars like Dr. R.P. Burn from England, Dr. S. Arumugam. From humble beginning, the department keeps growing, catering to the academic and intellectual needs of many. At first Mathematics was offered as an optional paper for intermediate courses. In 1945, taking into account the growing demand of the students to study Mathematics, as a major subject, UG in Mathematics was introduced. The Department of Mathematics was able to produce number of University rank holders each year in the Madras University and then in the Madurai Kamaraj University in early days.

Post-Graduation course (M.Sc.) in Mathematics was introduced in 1967, when the renowned thinker, Dr. R.P. Burn was heading the Department. St. John's was the third college in the Madurai University and was the first college in the southern districts to offer M.Sc., degree in Mathematics.

In 1971, Dr. R.P. Burn left India and the famous Mathematician, Dr. S. Arumugam became the head of the Post Graduate. He served the Department of Mathematics for a long period. After 21 years as a head, he left St. John's College and joined Manonmaniam Sundaranar University, Tirunelveli as head the Department of Mathematics.

In 2008, M.Phil. Mathematics was introduced and in 2017, both UG and PG Mathematics courses were started under self-financing schemes.

In 2017, the department started the full time Ph.D programme. At present, Dr. Jeyakumar, Dr. G.S. Grace Prema, Dr. A. Alwyn Asir, Dr. J. Vijaya Xavier Parthipan and Dr. J. Subhashini are the approved research guides under Manonmaniam Sundaranar University. There are

four scholars doing their research activities. The department having well-equipped research room, computer with net connectivity, Wi-Fi connectivity and INFLIBNET connectivity to equip the scholars in research activities.

The Department have a set of 14 qualified and dedicated faculty members under regular and self-financing schemes.




8.5 Result Analysis















The Department of Botany of St. John's College is one of the oldest departments in the College. In 1959, taking into account the growing demand of the students to study Botany, as a major subject, UG in Botany was introduced. The Department of Botany was able to produce a number of University rank holders each year in the Madras University and then in the Madurai Kamaraj University in the early days.

Post-Graduation course (M.Sc) in Botany was introduced in 1981. St. John's was the third college in the Madurai University area and was the first college in the southern districts to offer M.Sc., degree in Botany.


8.4 Result Analysis



5. Department Profile

5.1 About the department

The Department of Zoology has the distinction of catering to the academic needs of graduates, postgraduates and research students. The degree course started in 1963 was upgraded to the postgraduate status in 1986. Two years later, in 1988, M.Phil. degree course was introduced. In the year 1997, Ph.D research programme was also commenced, with the recognition of the Zoology Research Centre by ManonmaniamSundaranar University, Tirunelveli. The department is equipped to provide optimal solutions to student delight by adopting newer technologies. Sericulture as a vocational subject for the B.Sc. Zoology students was conducted from the year 1977 to 2003 with the assistance from the UGC and under this programme students were given on the job training in Sericulture.

The department is furnished with a good range of research journals, academic textbooks and sophisticated laboratory equipments. They are utilized for the regular and research activities of the students as well as the staff members. We have conducted UGC sponsored seminar and conference. Generally, seminar and conference conducted by our department focused themes on environmental awareness, biodiversity conservation and recent advance techniques in biology. Our department is well-equipped with the necessary and relevant laboratory and field oriented resources in basic and applied community extension research activities especially in vermiculture, sericulture, animal behavior, pollution, biodiversity, conservation, water quality, etc. The faculty members continuously engage themselves not simply in academic achievement of students but also

in research activities and also publish their findings in reputed journals of national and international status.

Separate and adequate laboratories are available for B.Sc., M.Sc., M.Phil and Research programmes. Provisions are available to carryout practicals related to molecular biology, microbiology, immunology, endocrinology and biochemistry. A well furnished research laboratory is available in working condition for animal and silkworm research in addition to the wet lab, biochemistry lab, biotechnology lab and instrumentation room creating a conducive environment for research as well as advanced learning.

An animal house has been constructed, specially, to rear bats in the Zoology Research Centre. This is used to study and know the minimum requirements for keeping tropical fruit bats in captivity. This will help us to maintain and care the orphan bats or injured bats and to get scientific information on growth studies, energetics, physiological or behavioural evaluation.

The bat rearing chamber is an octagonal chamber fitted with glass cubicle to facilitate observation without disturbing the bats. The glass cubicle was fitted in a manner that each and every corner of the chamber could be seen clearly, which helped to observe the natural activities of bats. Wooden poles fitted with aluminium wires were provided on the roof of the chamber to facilitate roosting of bats. The floor of the chamber was covered with sand for easy removal of the bolus and guano that may fall on the floor. Since sunlight diffused into the chamber through glass windows during daytime, the animals were subjected to natural day and night cycle during the rearing period. Many research studies have been carried out using this animal house and major projects were completed using this facility. More than 10 M.Phil. Projects were accomplished and 5 Ph.D. programmes were completed using this rearing chamber alone. The sericulture laboratory was constructed with this objective utilizing the financial assistance received from U.G.C. for "Vocational Sericulture Course" between the years 1997 and 2002. The centre has enough infra structure to rear many laying at a time and is also designed to grow bivoltine races too. The lab is also suitable for egg production. The centre has produced 2 Ph.D. and more than 25 M.Phil scholars. Most of the research work concentrated on evolving region specific varieties - both silkworm races as well as mulberry variety.




Nov 2017 result analysis B.Sc. Zoology (semester I)





















4. Overall assessment

- The virtual classroom with Audio visual effect and also reading section in Library is good.
- No visiting professors.
- No of volumes of Text books at library is not sufficient.
- Wi-fi bandwidth is too low.
- Web site of the college is not updated.
- Publications and participations in FDP, seminars, conferences and workshops by faculty members are minimal.
- Placement activities and placement related training are good.
- Placements in MNC are less.
- To complete 90 working days for first semester students is not feasible because of the admission procedure.

5. Suggestions

- More no of text book volumes has to be purchased
- Publications and participations in FDP, seminars, conferences and workshops by faculty members are to be increased.
- Paid leaves should be given to the faculty members to attend FDP, seminars, conferences and workshops.
- Incentives may be given to the faculty by the management for publishing papers and producing 100% results.
- External funded research projects to be taken up by the faculty members.
- Students may be asked to write job oriented online exams (elitmus, brainbench etc.,) for better placements
- Since the time frame of 90 days for first semester is not met, certain complex subjects such as optimization techniques may be shifted to other semester.
- Programming Languages like java and .net may be given as an elective both in theory and practicals.
- Syllabus for Research domain and self learning courses may be clearly defined and it may include more areas.
- Lab credits may be reduced from 4 to 2 or 3.
- Soft Skills and Communication Skills may be combined into a single subject.
- Uniform distribution of number of theories and practical has to be followed in all the semesters.
- Total number of papers may be reduced to 8 per semester having 5T and 3P.
- Software projects I,II,III may be removed as practicals and be included as a component in programming lab practicals.
- Importance has to be given for communication and soft skills classes.

6. Conclusion

- Fundamental rules and regulations followed by the college management and department staff members are very good.
- Basic amenities and infrastructure in the college and the department is very good.
- Library facility is very good and there is a vast scope of development.
- Faculty Attrition ratio is low and that is good for a management.
- Faculty members are well experienced, qualified and talented and need more motivation in the form of incentives for publications and training.
- Students are given good placements and it may further be improved by placing them in MNC.
